

- Is largest provider of postsecondary education, online courses and workforce training
- Served more than 5,000 businesses and nearly 110,000 workers for workforce training and assessment in 2018-19
- Has locations within a 30-minute drive of 95 % of all Kentuckians

- 106,874 students
- 60,738 enrolled in online courses

About KCTCS

- Since our creation, we have increased enrollment by 111% and credentials awarded by nearly 300%.
- KCTCS is 8th nationally in the number of credentials awarded and 2nd based on population.
- 79% of credentials awarded in 2018-19 were in the state's top five job sectors.

- Using the WRKS, GED students can take a shortterm college course simultaneously with GED classes.
- KCTCS provides \$400 to cover other expenses.
- 330 scholarships awarded in first year.

Lumina Foundation Grant: The Graduate! Network

- Community Ambassador program pilot at three colleges – Hazard, Jefferson, Madisonville
 - 45 ambassadors contact 45 prospective adult students.
- Marketing campaign targeting adults
 - Age 19-45
 - Unemployed/underemployed
 - High school grad or working toward GED
 - Household income under \$60,000
 - Underrepresented populations



Lumina Foundation Grant: The Graduate! Network

- Hazard Community and Technical College Tuesday Night Live
 - College provides family meal followed by children's activities while parent is in class.
- Jefferson Community and Technical College Code bootcamp transition, WRKS awareness, word-of-mouth network
- Madisonville Community College MCC Accelerate
 - •For working adults 1 class at a time; 1 night a week for 5 weeks
 - •WRKS eligible



Comebacker Brian Jones

- WRKS recipient, MCC Accelerate student
- Credits ambassador outreach for his college enrollment.
- Works for the City of Madisonville.
- Plans to get a bachelor's degree.





Programming & Services for Adults

- All 16 colleges added new programs, services and outreach to adults.
 - More advisors and navigators
- More evening and Saturday classes.
- Flexible class schedules Online classes with open labs.
- Adding more **short-term** classes like CDL and lineman.





Programming & Services for Adults

- Adult student hotline Fall 2020
 - Call center to provide one-on-one support.
- Web chat to assist with inquiries added to websites.
- Marketing campaign: radio, digital, public relations
- **Partners** participating: SkillsU, Cabinet for Education and Workforce Development, KHEAA, Kentucky Lottery



Removing Barriers

- Childcare offered on some campuses through third party.
- Agreements with bus companies for student transportation to classes.
- Food and necessities pantries





Putting People to Work

- Partnerships with businesses; custom training
- **Experiential learning**: KY FAME, apprenticeships
- Classes completed in weeks, not months or years.
- KCTCS is putting people to work quickly!
